From the Pastor

As we continue our journey through Lent, the Shadow of the Cross looms larger. During His final days, Jesus tried to foreshadow His death and brace the disciples for what was coming. The thought of His death was incomprehensible. For the disciples, this would have been the mark of ultimate failure. There was no way that they were going to accept that the One whom they had followed and claimed as the Messiah would die. This was not the outcome the disciples had prepared themselves for as they participated in the earthly ministry of Jesus.

But then it happened. What Jesus had tried to explain to His disciples materialized when he died a gruesome death on the Cross. Imagine the fear that they must have felt. Picture the chaos and confusion His disciples experienced as they tried to comprehend the passion, crucifixion, death, and burial of Jesus. In their minds, it was not supposed to end this way.

As the disciples huddled together in fear of what they imagined would happen to them, news arrived on the day after the Sabbath that the tomb was empty. "How could this be?" they wondered. And "What does this mean?" The One whom they had watched die on the Cross was rumored to be alive. Now nothing was making sense. Nobody had survived death on the Cross before, at least not to their knowledge.

But the rumors were true. The gates of death did not prevail, and Jesus rose from the grave. And suddenly life looked different. No longer did people need to live in fear of death because the Easter event was not just for Jesus but for all of us, too. St. Paul wrote "If we have been united with Him in a death like his, we will certainly be united in a resurrection like his." Romans 6:5

Come and join us as we compete our Lenten journey, and then as we celebrate the gift of life that the events of Easter morning bestow upon us. On Easter morning (April 17, 2022) we will gather for worship at 7 am, then enjoy breakfast together between the two services, the youth will participate in an Easter Egg hunt at 8:45, and then we will assemble for a traditional Easter Worship Service at 10 am.

Yes; "Christ is alive! Let Christians sing. His cross stands empty to the sky. Let streets and homes with praises ring. In death his love shall never die."

Alleluia! Christ Is Risen! Christ Is Risen Indeed! Alleluia!

Evangelism: Ann Helm. Ann submitted a request to rejoin the ASU United Campus Ministries through funding and running a "Food for Thought Program." United Campus Ministries doesn't limit any faith, non-faith, race or gender from attending or speaking at any of the events. Marie said she withdrew the church because the speakers that were being selected to speak were never Christian speakers. Ann will find out how speakers are selected. Leon also wants to know if our church would need to fund the meals and how many. The council agreed to table this discussion. The Children's Fair will be April 24th, from 12pm to 5pm. Our application for a booth has been submitted. An activity is required to have a booth.

Points to Ponder

Peace in Uncertainty In the Gospel of John, Jesus says to his disciples, "Do not let your hearts be troubled. You believe in God; believe also in me" (14:1).

In my little circle, we're stressed out right now. We're anxious about a friend's health. We're worried about projects getting done on time. We're uneasy about the state of the world.

And Jesus says not to let our hearts be troubled? Yes, he does. And he says a few verses later: "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid" (14:27).

This kind of peace doesn't mean that all the worrisome things outside of us are changed—it doesn't mean that suddenly our friends are healthy, our computers are cooperating, and our world leaders are wiser. No, it means that we are changed. Our hearts are changed. This is the peace Jesus gives us.

This is the peace of Christ.

United Campus Ministries (UCM)
Angelo State University and Howard College

Calvary Lutheran was recently invited to rejoin United Campus Ministries at Angelo State University.

After hearing a presentation from UCM at our Council meeting March 14, council members discussed the program and voted to participate again. Some of you may remember in the past serving as a trustee on the UCM board and/or helping prepare and serve Food4Thought meals for the students and staff.

UCM is a cooperative Christian ministry located on Dena Drive across from ASU which exists as a registered campus ministry to provide an environment where faith and knowledge and their relationship can be explored. UCM encourages spiritual and ethical development through programs of worship, study, outreach, and fellowship. It is open to all students, faculty, staff and administration of ASU and Howard College regardless of race, color, nationality, sexual orientation, or faith background.

UCM was formed in 1968 as a partnership between United Methodist, Episcopalian and Disciples of Christ churches. Presbyterian and Lutheran churches joined in the early 70's. UCM is governed by a board of trustees of up to 4 trustees from each of the five church disciplines who actively participate.

Members of Calvary Lutheran have an opportunity to participate in campus ministry through:


- *serving as a trustee on the UCM board which governs student member activities. Calvary can have up to 4 trustees. Meetings are monthly;
- *preparing and serving lunch at UCM, rotating with other churches. Roughly one Monday a month;
- *working directly with students under direction of the director/chaplain of UCM in worship, bible studies, discussions, retreats, theater, etc.; and
- *supporting financially through Calvary. Calvary's Lenten offerings this year is designated for UCM. Other donations can be made anytime.

Working with UCM is a wonderful way for Calvary to minister in outreach to young adult students at ASU. You can help UCM as much or as little as your time permits. This may be of special interest to alumni of ASU or Howard College, but all are invited to participate. 
