From the Pastor

How are you at keeping promises? I ask this because according to US News, approximately 80% of New Year resolutions fail by the second week of February. There are many reasons for this. According to a recent google search I made on my computer; New Year's resolutions fail for six main reasons.

- 1. You did not define the resolution well.
- 2. You did not have a plan.
- 3. You did not set yourself up for success
- 4. You did not define long, and short-term goals
- 5. You tried to do it alone...And
- 6. You knew deep down you would not do it.

Yes, New Year Resolutions are hard to keep. And yet each year many of us continue to make New Year resolutions and try to start the New Year off on the right foot. What New Year resolution have you made this year? And what are the chances that you will keep your New Year resolution?

I pray and hope that we are better at keeping promises that have a greater impact on our lives than merely going to the gym or staying on the latest Keto diet. Did you know that when we baptize children here at Calvary Lutheran Church **parents, God parents or sponsors, and the congregation** make promises that



are very important to the spiritual life of the person being baptized? Read again the promises made at the font.

On page 229 of the Evangelical Lutheran Book of Worship, the rubrics state "The presiding minister addresses parents or others who bring for baptism children who are not able to answer for themselves" with these words: "Called by the Holy Spirit, trusting in the grace and love of God, do you desire to have your child (children) baptized into Christ." And the parents reply: "I do."

And then the presiding minister addresses the baptismal party with these words. "As you bring this child (your children) to receive the gift of baptism, you are entrusted with responsibilities: to live with them among God's people, to bring them to the word of God and the holy supper, teach them the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Ten Commandments, to place in their hands the holy scriptures, and nurture them in faith and prayer, so that your children may learn to trust God, proclaim Christ through word and deed, and care for others and the world God made, and work for justice and peace."

The presiding minister then asks: "Do you promise to help your children grow in the Christian faith and life?" And the parents respond: "I do." The presiding minister then addresses the sponsors: "Sponsors, do you promise to nurture these persons in the Christian faith as you are empowered by God's Spirit, and help them live in the covenant of baptism and in communion with the church?" And the sponsors respond: "I do." And then, the presiding minister addresses the congregation and asks: "People of God, do you promise to support this child and pray for them in their new life in Christ? And the congregation responds: "We do."

As a Pastor I realize that keeping these promises is not always easy. But when we do keep these promises we are often surprised and amazed at how deeply our children's faith in God grows and flourishes. Our New Year resolutions may not make it past Groundhog Day, but I pray the promises we make when our children are baptized is a vow that we will keep everyday with the help of the Holy Spirit.


remnants of our Christmas season we are already pressed to navigate the new year. No wonder our heads are spinning, looking back and forward. No wonder January is named for a god with two heads.

We rethink old decisions and consequences and dwell on unlimited "what ifs" that might have resulted in beautiful "what might have beens" to hold us together. Throughout my life a friend of mine shared we are God's children, his creation. Psalm 139 says, "For you created my innermost being; You knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made." God loves each of us completely and without reservation. He's all in. John 3:16 says, "For

God so loved the world, that he gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believed in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." And God is not done with us until we take our dying breath. Philippians 1:6 says, "Being confident of this very thing, that He which hath begun a good work in you will complete it. "You can only do so much, but God can do the impossible, and he is not through with you yet.
